he saw a big cooking pot hanging from a beam above his head.

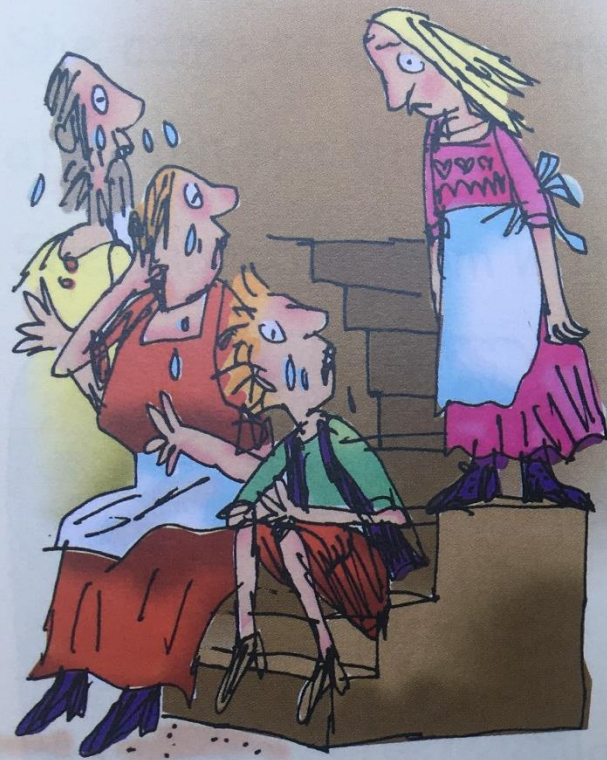




He crouched down and began to howl:

Off Barbara went.

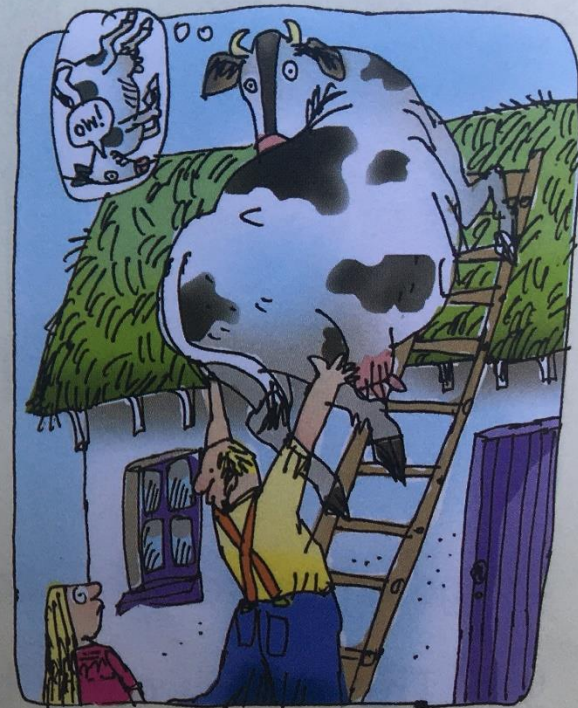
First, she came to a farmhouse

Page 15:	PROVE IT	What is funny about the end of this story? Did it end as you expected? How would you have ended it?
